You can impact a girl's life and give her the courage to stand up for herself and others.






CONFIDENCE

JOURNEYS

A **journey** is a themed set of activities focused on building specific leadership skills.





PATHWAYS

A pathway is the way girls choose to join and participate in Girl Scouting. Girls can choose from one or more of the six pathways including:

- A Troop
- Travel/destinations
- Camp

- Special Interests
- Events
- Virtual/online

Girl Scout Brownie (grades 2-3)

Girl Scout Junior (grades 4-5)

Girl Scout Cadette (grades 6-8)

Girl Scout Senior (grades 9-10)

Girl Scout Ambassador (grades 11-12)







TROOPS

- Troops are a specific Girl Scout pathway.
- New troops are formed with at least two unrelated volunteer leaders.
- Girls and/or leaders may be added to already established troops.
- Troops meet weekly, every two weeks, monthly, etc.
- Troops meet at schools, parks, churches or community centers.









GETTING STARTED

Complete and submit a Girl Scout registration form and volunteer application. Complete an online background check. Register your troops. Complete online Orientation, Fast Start and Leadership Essentials trainings.



TROOP LEADERSHIP CAN CONSIST OF

- One leader and one or more assistant leaders.
- Two or more co-leaders (equal share of responsibility).
- Women and Men. The female role model is essential to fulfilling the purpose of Girl Scouting. At least one member of the leadership team must be an adult female.
- Co-op Leadership. Some or all, adults share the responsibilities.
